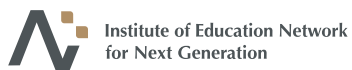

PRESENTATION OUTLINE



THE BRIEF

Students are required to present an environmental issue related to their school, local community, country or the global community. Presentations may explore the social and cultural dimensions of the issue and must relate to one or more of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs): 7 – Affordable & Clean Energy, 11 – Sustainable Cities & Communities, 13 – Climate Action, 14 – Life Below Water, and/or 15 – Life on Land.

PRESENTATION REQUIREMENTS

- 1 Define the environmental issue and why it is significant.
- 2 Support your presentation with facts, expert insights, or cultural knowledge.
- 3 Identify key challenges, opportunities, and realistic solutions.
- 4 Detail actions already completed or planned for the future.
- 5 Show how you involve local peers, experts, or community members.
- 6 Use visual slides, engaging storytelling, and shared team speaking.



Q&A SESSION

At the completion of your presentation, to extend your thinking or to clarify any information, the judges will ask you questions. Some example questions are below:

- ? Can you please explain...?
- ? Can you give me an example of...?
- ? How can you promote this issue?
- ? How can you encourage a change in behaviour of...?
- ? How can this response be scaled up?



POWERPOINT USAGE

In the presentation it is important to demonstrate your depth of knowledge of the issue. Your PowerPoint presentation should summarise your information (less is more). You should use the PowerPoint to 'speak to' not 'speak from', please try to avoid reading from the PowerPoint.

Dr. Kumi Kato is a professor at the Faculty of Tourism/ Graduate School of Tourism, Wakayama University/ Creating Happiness Incubation, Musashino University, Japan. She is also a Co-President, ISA, RC50 (International Tourism), PATA board member, and EarthCheck Research Institute researcher. She serves on a number of executive committees at national and regional governments promoting sustainable tourism and destination management. Currently chairing a committee to promote conservation and use of "good environments", a national project at the Ministry of the Environment.



GROUP CAPTAIN ROSS JONES

Group Captain Ross Jones is a retired Royal Australian Air Force official bringing 33 years of experience to the Global Link judging panel. His experience included senior logistics and training / education roles such as Deputy Chief of Staff at Air Force Headquarters and Commandant of the RAAF College. Sustainability was woven through much of his logistics career, from resourcing large scale operations to managing supply chains with long term efficiency in mind. As project manager for the Air Force Centenary in 2021, he led commercial sponsorships and delivered a youth engagement plan connecting school students across Australia with the Air Force, giving him valuable insight for assessing student sustainability projects.
